- 1 Haney, Banks and Zimbardo conducted a simulation study on social roles during which participants were placed in a mock prison environment. An alternative way to collect data about social roles would be to use the self-report method in real prisons.
 - (a) Describe the features of the self-report method in psychology. [5]
 - (b) Design an alternative investigation on social roles in real prisons using the self-report method and describe how it could be conducted. [10]
 - (c) Evaluate this alternative way of studying social roles in methodological and ethical terms. [10]
- **2** Loftus and Pickrell conducted a study to investigate the formation of false memories.
 - (a) What is meant by the 'cognitive approach' in psychology? [2]
 - **(b)** Explain why the Loftus and Pickrell study is an example of the cognitive approach. [3]
 - (c) Discuss the strengths and weaknesses of the cognitive approach using the Loftus and Pickrell study as an example. [10]
 - (d) Discuss the extent to which the Loftus and Pickrell study is ecologically valid. [10]
