

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Section A

Answer Question 1.

A questionnaire is a set of written questions designed for self-completion that is usually given or posted to respondents. Questionnaires produce quantitative data. As it is not practical to send a questionnaire to everyone that the researcher is interested in studying, it is necessary to select a sample of individuals from the wider research population. Various sampling techniques may be used to select this sample. The aim of sampling is usually to select a group of people with characteristics similar to the wider research population. This is known as a representative sample.

Questionnaires are commonly used in sociological research because they allow a large number of respondents to be asked a range of questions in a short space of time. Numerical information can therefore be collected on a large scale and, if a representative sample has been used, the information should accurately reflect the views of the wider research population. This approach is supported by *positivist sociologists*. However, interpretivists argue that questionnaires have little value in sociological research because they fail to reveal the complex nature of human behaviour.
